DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The Sudanese state apparatus is signaling a transition from pure survival to active reconstruction, despite ongoing combat operations and a severe energy crisis. On August 6, 2026, government broadcasts emphasized the **Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF)** tactical momentum in Omdurman and Kordofan, juxtaposed with claims of systemic [internal fragmentation](#) within the **Rapid Support Forces (RSF)**. High-ranking officials, including **General Yasir Al-Atta**, are reinforcing a nationalist narrative that dismisses the RSF's political "Founding" (Tasees) project as a failed "rehearsal" for secular rule, instead framing the conflict as a defense of the "1956 State"—a reference to Sudan's post-independence identity. This ideological consolidation is paired with a push for **digital transformation** and urban

planning, suggesting the government is preparing for a post-conflict governance model even as the front lines remain volatile.

Simultaneously, Sudan is navigating a complex international environment where the **United Arab Emirates (UAE)** is increasingly under fire for its alleged role in [arming the RSF](#). Reports of a US Congressional push to sanction the UAE and investigate its influence in Africa are being leveraged by Khartoum to isolate its rivals. Meanwhile, the government is deepening its "strategic alliance" with **Turkey**, focusing on military-industrial cooperation and [reconstruction projects](#). Domestically, the administration faces a critical infrastructure test following a major fire at the **Merowe Dam**, which officials have characterized as [systemic sabotage](#) linked to RSF field losses. The state's response involves a pivot toward renewable energy, specifically solar and wind, to mitigate the vulnerability of the national grid.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Energy Grid Sabotage and Renewable Pivot:** A major fire at the Merowe Dam destroyed 16 primary feeder cables, causing widespread outages. The Ministry of Energy and Oil is treating this as a [targeted attack](#) coinciding with SAF victories. In response, the government has announced the implementation of [three solar power plants](#) and a 100 MW wind project to diversify energy sources.

- **RSF Political and Military Fragmentation:** Former RSF advisors and defectors are publicly detailing the collapse of the "Tasees" political project, describing it as an [external agenda](#) devoid of local support. Reports highlight ethnic tensions within the RSF, particularly regarding the [selective evacuation](#) of wounded fighters based on tribal affiliation.
- **US Diplomatic Shift on UAE Support:** Sudanese analysts are closely monitoring a **US Congressional memorandum** accusing the UAE of violating arms embargos and fueling the conflict. This is being framed as a [pivotal moment](#) that could disrupt RSF supply lines and provide Khartoum with diplomatic leverage in Washington.
- **Turkey-Sudan Strategic Integration:** Bilateral relations have moved beyond diplomatic pleasantries to **military-industrial and logistical execution**. Key projects include the [twinning of Port Sudan](#) with Turkey's Mersin port and Turkish involvement in agricultural technology and war manufacturing.
- **Resumption of Sovereign Services:** Sudan Airways has gradually [resumed operations](#) after a two-year hiatus, and several universities in Omdurman have reopened, signaling a state-led effort to project [civilian normalcy](#) in "liberated" zones.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Armed Conflict & Militarization The SAF is shifting toward "offensive operations" to regain control of Kordofan and Darfur. Military leaders are emphasizing the integration of **Joint Forces** (former rebel groups) and **Popular Resistance** units. The rhetoric has evolved from defensive survival

to the [liberation of all regions](#), with a specific focus on the strategic importance of the **Bara-Omdurman** export road.

Critical Infrastructure Security The Merowe Dam incident highlights a critical vulnerability in the centralized power grid. The government is struggling to balance **emergency repairs** with long-term reconstruction. The Ministry of Energy is utilizing [Turkish and Egyptian expertise](#) to stabilize the grid while simultaneously clearing mines in **Al-Mogran** to allow for infrastructure maintenance.

Information Warfare & Disinformation Khartoum is actively combatting what it calls "external disinformation rooms" managed by specialized agencies abroad. The state's counter-narrative focuses on [RSF's lack of professional media](#) and its reliance on "WhatsApp groups" to spread rumors. The government is also documenting **human rights violations** to use as evidence in future international legal proceedings.

Diplomacy & Statecraft The visit of the **AU Peace and Security Council** to Khartoum is viewed as a sign that the international community is beginning to recognize the [legitimacy of the state](#) over the "rebel militia." Sudan is also positioning itself as a key player in **Red Sea security**, seeking to leverage its coastline to attract investments from Turkey and Russia.

Food & Water Security Agriculture in **East Darfur** and **Gedaref** faces severe threats from a lack of vaccines for livestock and the [destruction of veterinary labs](#) in Nyala and Soba. The state is attempting to mitigate this by producing "improved seeds" in [secure zones like Gadarif](#) to prepare for a post-war planting season.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Ideological Battle for the "1956 State" A recurring theme in current Sudanese discourse is the defense of the **1956 State** against the RSF's attempt to "found" a new order. Military leaders and state intellectuals are framing the RSF as an [anti-national entity](#) that seeks to destroy the professional civil service and traditional social structures. This narrative is designed to unify the diverse components of the SAF-aligned coalition, including former rivals from the **Juba Peace Agreement**, under a banner of institutional continuity.

Reconstruction as Political Legitimacy

The government is increasingly using "reconstruction" and "digital transformation" as tools of **political signaling**. By announcing plans for [electronic governance](#) and holding urban development councils in Port Sudan, the administration is attempting to demonstrate that it is the only entity capable of restoring order. This is a deliberate contrast to the **looting and destruction** attributed to the RSF in areas like [Bara](#), where infrastructure has been systematically dismantled.

Regional Volatility and the Eastern Front

There is growing concern regarding the [Ethiopia-Eritrea border tensions](#) and their potential to spill over into Sudan's eastern states. Analysts suggest that a conflict in the **Tigray/Amhara** regions could force the SAF to divert resources from the western front to secure its eastern borders. This regional instability is being monitored by the **Ministry of Foreign Affairs**, which is coordinating with the UN regarding [Ethiopian refugees](#) crossing into Sudan.

INTERNAL DYNAMICS & DOMESTIC INSTABILITY

- **Elite Cohesion:** High-level SAF leadership, represented by **General Yasir Al-Atta**, appears to have successfully integrated previously autonomous factions like the **Awakening Revolutionary Council** led by **Musa Hilal**. This suggests a consolidation of the [tribal-military alliance](#) against the RSF.
- **Institutional Decay vs. Resilience:** While the central government in Khartoum has been displaced, the **civil service** is attempting a "digital pivot." The **Khartoum State Digital Platform** aims to [restore administrative capacity](#), though its effectiveness remains limited by the ongoing energy crisis.
- **Public Sentiment:** State media is heavily promoting "Army Day" (August 14) to bolster morale. However, the [testimonies of victims](#) from Bara and Omdurman reveal a population traumatized by looting and sexual violence, creating a long-term [social order challenge](#) for whichever entity controls these regions.

EXTERNAL DYNAMICS & GLOBAL POSTURE

Sudan's global posture is increasingly **defensive toward the West** and **opportunistic toward Eurasia**. The government portrays the "outside world" as divided: a hostile UAE-led bloc seeking to dismantle Sudan, and a supportive **Turkey-Qatar-Russia** bloc providing the tools for survival. The [strategic partnership with Turkey](#) is the cornerstone of this policy, offering a path to military self-sufficiency and economic reconstruction without the political conditions often attached to Western aid.

Sudan is also weaponizing its **Red Sea geography**, using the threat of regional instability to demand the [lifting of its suspension](#) from the African Union, arguing that a collapsed Sudan would destabilize the entire Horn of Africa.

THE ECONOMIC ENVIRONMENT

The Sudanese economy is in a state of "war management," characterized by severe disruptions to primary exports and a heavy reliance on **strategic partnerships** for basic survival. Inflation and currency stability are not directly addressed, but the [suspension of major UAE-backed projects](#) like the Abu Amama port and the Abu Hamad agricultural scheme has left a massive investment vacuum that Turkey and Qatar are being courted to fill.

Key Economic Vectors

- **Energy Costs:** The fire at Merowe Dam has necessitated **emergency imports of cables** from China and specialized equipment from Turkey, putting further strain on [foreign currency reserves](#).
- **Livestock Sector Crisis:** Veterinary services have collapsed in 20% of the country's livestock zones, threatening the [export of 40 million head of cattle](#)—a primary source of hard currency.
- **SME Innovation:** In more stable regions like the North and River Nile, youth entrepreneurs are pivoting to **innovative food processing**, such as "millet jam," to replace imported goods and [secure local food supplies](#).

- **Financial Infrastructure:** The **Omdurman National Bank** has successfully [reconnected to the national electronic payment switch](#), a critical step for restoring commercial activity in liberated areas.

LEADERSHIP CHANGES

Recent leadership dynamics focus on the **re-emergence of traditional and paramilitary leaders** into the SAF's formal orbit, signifying a shift in the military's coalition-building strategy.

- **General Yasir Al-Atta:** His frequent field visits and [ideological speeches](#) position him as the "voice of the state," often overshadowing other [السيادية](#) (Sovereignty Council) members. He is currently the primary architect of the SAF-Joint Force integration.
- **Musa Hilal:** The leader of the Awakening Revolutionary Council has [realigned with the SAE](#), a major blow to the RSF's tribal mobilization efforts in Darfur.
- **Moatassim Ibrahim:** The Minister of Energy and Oil has been given expanded powers to [negotiate directly with foreign states](#) (Turkey, Russia, Belarus) for infrastructure rehabilitation, bypassing traditional bureaucratic hurdles.
- **Ibrahim (Defected RSF Advisor):** His public testimony serves as a [psychological warfare tool](#), signaling that the RSF's intellectual and political wing is abandoning the Hemedti faction.

EDITORIAL POSTURE & STORY HIERARCHY

The network's editorial hierarchy is strictly aligned with **nationalist mobilization**. The

lead stories were the **April 15 Heroism Narrative** (detailing the defense of the Presidential Guesthouse) and the **Energy Crisis Sabotage**. These stories are designed to induce a sense of "national threat" while providing a "heroic solution." Buried stories included the **famine risks** and the **actual casualty figures** from recent battles in Darfur. The tone is nationalistic and reassuring, emphasizing that "the state survives." A conspicuous omission is any mention of **peace negotiations** or a ceasefire; the editorial line has shifted entirely to "victory through liberation."

GEOPOLITICAL FRAMING

The broadcast frames the international system as a **mercenary-driven arena** where external powers seek to exploit Sudan's resources through proxy militias.

COUNTRIES and LEADERS

- **Turkey / Erdogan:** Portrayed as a "strategic ally" and a "strong partner" that respects [Sudanese sovereignty](#). Turkey is framed as the primary provider of technology and military support.
- **United Arab Emirates (UAE):** Framed as a **hostile aggressor** and the primary financier of "terrorist militias." The UAE is characterized as a "malign influence" in [African affairs](#).
- **United States:** Portrayed as a **chaotic and hypocritical actor**. While the Congress is praised for its "late realization" of UAE's role, the State Department is viewed with skepticism for its [insistence on negotiations](#).
- **Qatar:** Framed as a **principled humanitarian friend**, focusing on [medical aid and digital transformation](#).

NON-STATE & CORPORATE ACTORS

- **Rapid Support Forces (RSF):** Consistently labeled as a "terrorist militia" and "mercenaries." Framed as an [ideologically hollow](#) criminal enterprise.
- **UNICEF / World Bank:** Portrayed as **necessary logistical partners** for the "Educational Grant" program, though the state maintains [oversight of the funds](#).

INFORMATION WARFARE ENVIRONMENT

- **Narrative Seeding:** The government is seeding the idea that the RSF is [abandoning its wounded](#) based on race, a clear psychological operation aimed at inciting internal tribal dissent within the militia.
- **Historical Revisionism:** The heavy focus on the **1956 Independence** and the **El-Haggana** history is intended to frame the current SAF as the [direct successor](#) to Sudan's national liberation movement, delegitimizing the RSF as an "alien" force.
- **Censorship of Defeat:** While field advances are detailed, **RSF counter-attacks** are minimized or framed solely as "looting raids" on civilians rather than military engagements.

HYPOTHESES AND FUTURE OUTLOOK

- **RSF Political Dissolution:** If the "Tasees" project continues to lose its intellectual leadership, the RSF will likely devolve into **localized warlordism** with no central political objective, making a negotiated settlement nearly impossible.

- **Energy Decoupling:** The government's pivot to solar will likely result in a **fragmented energy landscape**, where secure northern and riverine states develop localized grids, further isolating RSF-controlled regions from the national economy.
- **Regional War Trigger:** The [Ethiopia-Eritrea flashpoint](#) could be the most likely "Black Swan" to derail SAF's offensive, potentially drawing Sudan into a broader regional conflict.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect an intensification of **SAF air strikes** in Omdurman and Khartoum North following the "Army Day" celebrations. The Ministry of Energy will likely announce **emergency power rationing** as Merowe Dam repairs continue.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): Sudan will likely formalize **new military-industrial contracts** with Turkey and Russia. A "National Reconstruction Fund" may be established to manage Qatari and Turkish investments in Port Sudan and the agricultural sector.

Long Term (1-5 Years): A structural shift toward a **decentralized, digitally-managed state** may emerge, with Port Sudan serving as the de facto administrative capital. The "1956 State" ideology will likely be codified into a new transitional constitution that permanently **bans paramilitary entities**.

RISK ASSESSMENT

- **Total Grid Failure:** Continued **sabotage of power infrastructure** could lead to a systemic collapse of water and hospital services in secure zones. **Triggers:** Successful RSF raids on transformer stations. **Likelihood:** High. **Impact:** Critical. **Mitigations:** Rapid deployment of [Turkish floating power plants](#) (powerships) and solar scaling.
- **Regional Spillover:** A conflict between **Ethiopia and Eritrea** could destabilize Sudan's eastern flank. **Triggers:** Border skirmishes in the Fashaga or Tigray regions. **Likelihood:** Moderate. **Impact:** High. **Mitigations:** Diplomatic coordination via the [African Union Peace and Security Council](#).
- **Zoonotic Outbreak:** The lack of **livestock vaccines** and veterinary lab destruction could lead to a massive animal die-off or a cross-species disease outbreak. **Triggers:** Rainy season flooding and uncontrolled animal migration. **Likelihood:** Moderate. **Impact:** High. **Mitigations:** [Importing vaccines from South Africa](#) via Chad/safe corridors.
- **Hyper-Inflation/Currency Collapse:** While not featured, the cost of reconstruction and fuel imports is unsustainable. **Triggers:** Failure to secure a multi-billion dollar credit line from a strategic ally. **Likelihood:** High. **Impact:** Moderate/High. **Mitigations:** Resource-for-infrastructure [deals with Turkey/Russia](#).

- **Information Collapse:** If RSF "disinformation rooms" successfully sow discord between the SAF and the **Popular Resistance**, the internal front could crumble. **Triggers:** High-profile friendly fire incidents or ethnic polarization. **Likelihood:** Moderate. **Impact:** Critical. **Mitigations:** [Psychological screening](#) and training for SAF personnel.

GAPS & BLIND SPOTS

- **RSF Military Reality:** The broadcasts rely heavily on **defector testimonies**; there is a lack of objective data on the RSF's remaining heavy weaponry and drone capabilities.
- **Civilian Casualties:** The "liberation" narrative obscures the **collateral damage** occurring during SAF air strikes in densely populated areas like Omdurman.
- **Russian Involvement:** While Turkey and Qatar are mentioned, the **Russian naval and military role** is conspicuously absent from the formal news, despite its known strategic importance.
- **Domestic Resistance:** There is no coverage of **pro-democracy or anti-war civilian movements** (e.g., Resistance Committees), creating a blind spot regarding domestic political opposition to the military's long-term rule.

CONTRARIAN NARRATIVE SCENARIOS

- **The "Reconstruction Mirage":** The government's focus on reconstruction and digital transformation might be a **stalling tactic** to project stability to foreign investors while the military is actually losing territory in the West. The "sabotage" of Merowe Dam could be a cover for **technical failure** due to a lack of maintenance during the war.
- **US-UAE Theater:** The US Congressional move against the UAE might be a **performative gesture** to appease human rights groups, while the US administration secretly maintains its security partnership with Abu Dhabi, ensuring the RSF remains a viable "spoiler" in Sudan to prevent a total SAF-Islamist victory.
- **Black Swan - The Assassination of Hemedti:** The sudden death or confirmed removal of the RSF leader would not lead to peace but to a **Libyan-style fragmentation**, where dozens of independent militias fight for control of gold mines, making the state's "reconstruction" plans irrelevant.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For Statecraft/Public Sector:

- Prioritize the **decentralization of the energy grid** through micro-grids and solar to reduce the strategic value of the Merowe Dam as a target.

- Leverage the **US Congressional memorandum** to push for a formal UN arms embargo specifically targeting the UAE's aviation supply chains into Chad and Libya.
- Formalize the **Joint Forces integration** into a permanent "National Guard" to prevent post-war friction between the SAF and former rebel groups.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Energy Sector:** There is a massive, state-backed opportunity for **off-grid solar and wind** providers to service industrial zones in Northern and River Nile states.
- **Supply Chain:** Investors should pivot toward **Port Sudan-Turkey logistics**, as the UAE-aligned trade routes remain high-risk and politically toxic.
- **Agri-Tech:** Opportunities exist for **seed technology and mobile veterinary labs** that can operate in decentralized, secure hubs.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP
