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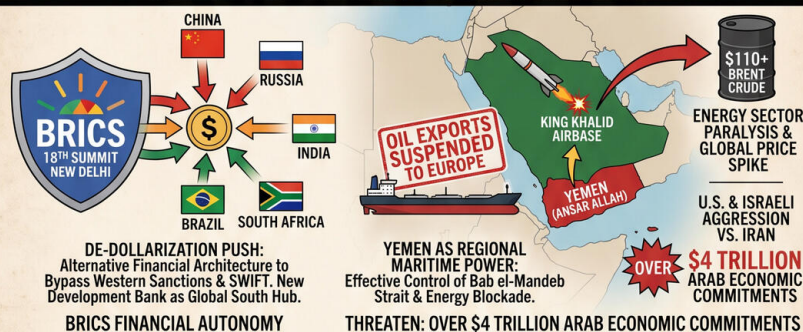

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DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

September 15, 2026, marks a pivotal moment of global geopolitical realignment and intensifying energy warfare. The 18th BRICS Summit in New Delhi has concluded with a decisive push toward **de-dollarization** and the creation of alternative financial architectures to bypass Western sanctions. This shift is occurring simultaneously with a major escalation in Asia Occidental, where Yemeni Houthi forces have successfully targeted Saudi Arabian airbases, forcing Riad to [suspend oil exports](#) to Europe. The resulting surge in Brent crude to \$110 per barrel is placing acute pressure on global supply chains already strained by a "Super El Niño" event that is severely restricting [Panama Canal traffic](#) and threatening food security across the Americas.

In Latin America, a sharp ideological divide has emerged between sovereignist administrations and right-leaning governments utilizing emergency powers. The

Colombian administration of Abelardo de la Espriella and the Bolivian government of Rodrigo Paz are both facing significant civil unrest as they move to [militarize domestic order](#) and implement IMF-mandated reforms. Conversely, Venezuela and Brazil are projecting stability through regional alliances and technological sovereignty, even as they navigate the fallout of natural disasters and aggressive U.S. trade policies. The return of Donald Trump to the U.S. presidency has reintroduced high-intensity [tariff warfare](#), affecting Mexico and Canada, and further driving the Global South toward the BRICS-China-Russia axis.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Energy Sector Paralysis:** Yemeni Houthi (Ansar Allah) forces executed a large-scale missile and drone attack on the [King Khalid airbase](#) in Saudi Arabia, resulting in a strategic suspension of crude shipments to European markets and a significant spike in [global fuel prices](#).
- **BRICS Financial Autonomy:** The New Delhi summit finalized a [multilateral re-insurance mechanism](#) for maritime transport and a digital asset-backed payment platform to circumvent the U.S. dollar and SWIFT system.
- **Colombian Constitutional Crisis:** President Abelardo de la Espriella has triggered widespread protests by announcing a protocol allowing the [police to enter](#) university campuses, a move decried by students and legal experts as a violation of university autonomy.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Rise of the "Global Resistance" Bloc

INTERNAL DYNAMICS & DOMESTIC INSTABILITY

- **Colombia:** The administration is facing a major legitimacy crisis. The [university entry protocol](#) has unified student movements, labor unions, and opposition senators like Alejandro Ocampo, who warned the policy would result in "dead students." The refusal to [purchase land](#) for the peace accord has further alienated the campesino sector, which views the move as a return to land dispossession.
- **Bolivia:** Institutional decay is evident as the government relies on the [90% support](#) of right-wing legislative factions to maintain emergency powers. The economy is suffering from acute fuel shortages and price hikes, leading to [urban protests](#) that the administration admits it fears will overwhelm police and military forces.
- **Argentina:** Social stability is fracturing as poverty reaches [9.4 million people](#). The Milei administration's policies have caused an 11.3% drop in beef consumption and a housing crisis where [2.5 million young adults](#) cannot afford to leave their family homes.

EXTERNAL DYNAMICS & GLOBAL POSTURE

- **United States:** The Trump administration is portrayed as a **chaotic and unilateral actor**. By imposing tariffs on Canada and Mexico, Washington has effectively [fractured the TMEC/USMCA](#) integration, pushing partners to seek bilateral deals with China.
- **China:** Beijing is positioning itself as the **stable alternative** to U.S. protectionism. Through the "Siftis 2026" fair and the BRICS Summit, China is expanding its [service and technology exports](#), moving from a "world factory" to a "world R&D hub."

The network maintains a strong anti-imperialist posture, prioritizing stories that highlight U.S. aggression and the rise of the Global South. The **lead stories** emphasize the U.S. "energy blockade" against Cuba and the Houthi "resistance" in Yemen.
